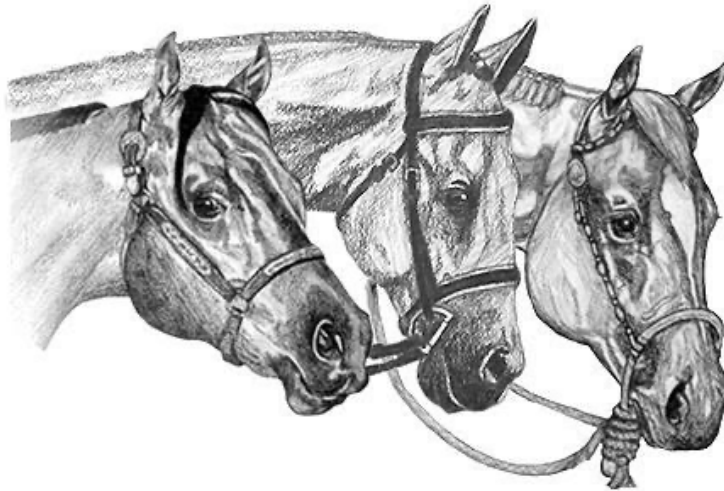

ANNAPOLIS VALLEY EX GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

Rule change only by Management Board approval

These General Rules apply to all competitors and exhibitors and have precedence over any other rules adopted by Sub-Committees in any case where there is a conflict between rules.

1. The Board of Directors has the final and absolute right to interpret all rules and regulations and determine all matters, questions or disputes in regard hereto. The Board of Directors has the right to amend or add to these rules and regulations as their judgment may determine, from time to time. Entries accepted are subject to this rule. Management may remove exhibitors without refund for disorderly conduct.
2. The Management reserves the right to refuse any exhibitor for lack of space subject to the provision that space will be allocated in the order that entries are received. NS public Health Guidelines and Safe Sport Principles must be followed at all times.
3. All entries must be made on prescribed entry forms obtained upon application to the Exhibition Office. Entries close on Aug. 7th. Late entries will be accepted if space allows and subject to a \$50 late entry fee.
4. Entries will not be accorded precedence as to order of receipt if incomplete.
5. The Management shall have the sole right and discretion to allocate exhibitors to whatever barn, building, stall or space is considered appropriate,

GROUND & BUILDING

7. Please refer to the prize list section pertaining to your classes for arrival time information. The building and grounds will be open for exhibitors. Exhibitors are reminded that they enter all exhibits at their own risk.
8. The Exhibition grounds will be open to the public during events if current Public Health Guidelines allow.
9. No pets allowed on the Exhibition grounds during Exhibition events, pets of exhibitors must be confined to the trailer park.
10. All officials will be designated by proper badges or other designation. Zoning may be in place.
11. **The Annapolis Valley Exhibition restricts all smoking of tobacco, cannabis, e-cigarettes, and waterpipes within 15 meters of all structures on the Exhibition Grounds.**

JUDGING & PRIZES

12. No person shall be permitted to enter the judge's ring while judging is in progress, except the judges, their attendants, the officials and such exhibitors as have been called into the ring by the judge or judges.
13. No changes in classification can be made after judging commences.
14. Any person interfering with the judges while in the discharge of their duties shall be removed from the grounds.
15. All judges shall give reasons for the placings when asked and may give reasons in any case.
16. Any exhibitor found to have employed any disingenuous measure by which the objects of the Exhibition have been defeated, shall not only forfeit the prize which might be awarded to his or her but, shall in future, be barred from competition in the Exhibition.
17. Exhibitors must be ready to enter the ring when called, failure to comply will result in forfeit of the right to show in the relevant class.
18. Committee discretion is final word if a horse is fit show
20. Stalls for all livestock entries shall be allowed in order of receipt of entries at the time of entry. Exhibitors may not trade stalls without obtaining the approval of Management and recording the approved trade at the Exhibition Office.
21. All registered animals are subject to being checked for registration. Registration papers and R.O.P data must be available prior to and up to the time of judging. No animals will be accepted as purebred or registered until registration papers are available from the owner.
22. Entries in classes composed of more than one animal may be made up of animals shown individually.
23. Any animal showing signs of infectious disease or parasite infection will be barred from the Exhibition and removed forthwith from the grounds.
24. All livestock competing for special prizes must also be entered in at least one (1) regular exhibition class.
25. Feed and bedding for livestock is the responsibility of the exhibitor. All manure and bedding shall be cleaned up by 8:30 am each day. Stalls will be cleaned, and all manure and bedding must be removed from the stall when the animal leaves the grounds or prize money will be forfeited. A minimum charge of \$50.00 per stall will be assessed against exhibitors failing to abide by the rule whether or not any prize money is due.

26. Grooming and care of animals will take place in the stalls or designated area. Cross-tying of livestock in the aisles is not permitted.
27. Due to concerns for movement of traffic and safety of attendees and exhibitors at the Exhibition, the Management Board shall fix times for departure of livestock and other exhibits when classes have been completed each year. For the current year, livestock may be removed after classes.
28. Livestock trailers are not permitted to be parked inside the grounds. Exhibitors who have not been allocated stalls but wish to show their livestock will park trailers in spots allocated to them by an official.
29. The owner and handler of livestock will be responsible for the behavior and control of his or her animal. Livestock must be well-broken to halter. No dangerous uncontrolled animals will be permitted. The Manager may order any such animal off the grounds without reimbursement for any entry fee or other fees paid.
30. Trailer Park admission as Livestock Exhibitor requires participation in 3 classes or more (or go as a non-exhibitor if space permits) Limited due to spacing requirement of NS government guidelines.
31. Trailers may arrive in the trailer court after 5pm the night before competing at the Modified Ex. Trailer court noise curfew is 11:00 pm.
- 32. Any Trailer pumping Grey Water or Black Water on the ground in the trailer park or exhibition grounds will be removed immediately.**
- 33. After each Exhibition and all Weekend Events trailers must be removed from grounds or they will be removed at the owner's expense.**
- 34. Trailer Park: All 15 amps may be only 15 amps before the breaker trips. For Example: It will run fridge, lights. Air conditioners and small hot water heater will trip the breaker, Run Air Conditioners at your own risk. Any electrical problems in the Trailer Park, you will need a purchase order from the Office for Electrician to repair**

SAFETY OF EXHIBITS

Employees will endeavor to protect and ensure good order but owners themselves must assume all risk for exhibits. Should any exhibit be accidentally or willfully damaged or injured, lost or stolen, the Exhibition will provide whatever assistance it can towards the recovery of the same, but will not make any payment for the value thereof or reimbursement for the loss.

Annapolis Valley Exhibition Liquor and Safety Policy

The Board and Staff of the Annapolis Valley Ex wish our visitors to have a great time while at our Exhibition. Please note our policy on the supply of liquor during Ex

- No person under the age of 19 will be permitted to purchase/consume liquor on our site
- Persons who are lucky enough to look under 19 may be asked for identification at our discretion
- No liquor is to be consumed outside of our pub area, or for residents and guests of the trailer park areas liquor may only be consumed inside trailers. Failure to follow this directive may result in fines from the RCMP.
- Persons who appear impaired will be refused entry to the Exhibition grounds or pub.
- Persons who are violent or causing upset will be removed by security/RCMP and may be barred from the grounds for a time decided by Directors
- Please be safe – don't drink and drive. Impaired drivers will be reported to the RCMP for the safety of other visitors and themselves
- The Ex asks that t-shirts or shirt be worn at all times during your visit.
- Please enjoy yourself and act responsibly

ANNAPOLIS VALLEY EXHIBITION OPEN LIGHT HORSE SHOW RULES

1. **All Junior/Youth mounted riders, 18 years & under as of January 1st of current year, MUST wear protective headgear.**
2. A **Junior** competitor is defined as 18 years and under as of January 1st of the current year.
3. Proof of \$1,000,000.00 insurance to be attached to entry form. The Committee reserves the right to limit the number of entries.
4. Please report to the Exhibition Office before stabling. **No re-arranging stalls.**
5. **Stalls must be stripped of bedding and manure before leaving the grounds, so they are ready for the next exhibitor. Failure to clean stall will result in a \$50 stall cleaning fee. If the fee remains unpaid, the competitor will be ineligible to register for subsequent events hosted by the Annapolis Valley Exhibition.**
6. Do not rearrange stalls or stabling.
7. **Health of Animals** - It is advised that all entries should have been immunized against equine influenza and rhino within one year. It is suggested that this should have been done at least one month before the show in case of any reaction. Any animal which appears, in the opinion of the Exhibition Veterinarian, to be ill will be asked to leave the grounds. It is also advised that all entries be Coggins tested within the previous six months.
8. **Refunds** - Veterinarian certificate for horse, Doctor certificate for rider, for refund of entry fee, within 2 weeks of show.
9. **Class Times** - Owing to the length of the Horse Show Program no delays will be tolerated. All entries must enter the ring immediately when a class is called. When the gate is closed, no further entries will be admitted.
10. **Vehicle Entry** - All vehicles and trailers must enter through the West Gate unless other arrangements have been made with the manager.
11. **Horse Trailers** - There will be no parking of livestock trailers on the Exhibition Grounds. Reserved parking for livestock trailers in parking lot.
12. **Bedding** - Exhibitors must bring their own.
13. **Cross-tying** - No cross-tying of any animal in the barns.
14. Show ring attire required for all classes (except costume class).
15. **Point Systems** – For classes where points will accumulate for a division Champion, points will be awarded in the following manner: **1st – 7; 2nd – 5; 3rd – 4; 4th – 3; 5th – 2; 6th – 1.** A competitor, horse/rider combination, will qualify only once per class. In the event of a tie for Champion, the exhibitor with the most 1st place ribbons will win. If there is still a tie 2nd place ribbons will determine the champion.
16. ***New in 2021, the Annapolis Valley Exhibition Light Horse Show will have designated Scotia Series classes. Classes eligible for Scotia Series points will be identified as a Scotia Series.**

SCOTIA SERIES OVERVIEW

- The NSEF Scotia Series is a provincial circuit.
- Athletes must be NSEF Members to be eligible for Scotia Series Annual Awards.
- Athletes from Nova Scotia competing in the Scotia Series live in one of the six Nova Scotian Districts.
- Annual awards are presented at the NSEF Awards Reception. The Sportsmanship Award for the junior athlete is awarded by nomination.
- References to Athlete(s) throughout this handbook refer to the human athlete (competitor, driver, or handler).

SCOTIA SERIES COMPETITION RULES and REGULATIONS

In addition to the competition organizing committee's requirements, there are also NSEF requirements specific to Scotia Series:

1. Membership

- a) Current NSEF membership is required to compete and qualify for Annual awards.
- b) Non-NS residents require an out of province P/TSO membership to be eligible to compete.
- c) NSEF memberships can be verified online, or members must provide proof of membership. Out of Province members must provide proof of membership.

2. **Age Categories:** where age is indicated the age is defined as of January 1st, 2020.

3. **Person Responsible:** The person who signs the entry form is the person responsible for the welfare of the horse and for the actions of the support team of that entry. Junior competitors must have their entry form signed by the parent or legal guardian deemed responsible for said junior.

4. **Competitor Conduct:** any act of discourtesy or disobedience by an owner, groom, athlete, coach, or family member to an official, COC member, other spectators, or competitors while at the competition, will disqualify the associated horse and competitor from competition. The COC has the right to remove anyone from the competition without being liable for compensation or damages.

5. **Protective Headgear:** Although competition management may enforce a stricter helmet policy, all competitions must adhere to the following NSEF Policy on Protective Headwear:

NSEF Helmet Policy: All Competitors must wear ASTM/SEI, or BSI/BS EN, approved protective headgear, with the safety harness correctly secured at all times while mounted or driving at the competition or anywhere on the competition grounds.

Exception - **Competitors 19 years old as of January 1st, competing in the *Western Performance Division* without an approved safety helmet must submit a signed Scotia Series Helmet Waiver** to the competition organizer.

6. **Ring Numbers** - issued by the competition office and must be worn at all times. This includes the competition arena and the schooling/warm up area. If at any time a horse is being handled by an individual, other than the competitor, the handler must be in possession of the ring number.

7. **Lunging** of horses is permitted in a specified designated area only. Lunging is not permitted in any areas that horses are being ridden or driven. In any class or event requiring equipment, athletes **MUST NOT** use the competition's equipment for practicing before the class or event begins, on penalty of disqualification. Participants may only use obstacles provided by the competition committee in the warm up ring.

8. **Mannerly stallions** may be shown by SENIOR COMPETITORS ONLY.

9. Falls

- a) An athlete is considered to have fallen when, either voluntarily or involuntarily, separation from the unfallen horse occurs in such a way that said athlete touches the ground or finds it necessary to seek support or assistance to regain a seated position.
- b) An athlete has fallen when vaulting or remounting to regain sitting astride the horse is required.
- c) A horse is considered to have fallen when at the same time both its shoulder and quarters have touched either the ground or the obstacle and the ground.

10. **Safety** (in addition to discipline specific rules stated throughout this document)

- a) Competitors are responsible to know the method of reversing used during group classes. The competition committee shall indicate the method of reversing during group classes, whether it is to the inside or toward the wall. i.e. A proper competition ring reverse for most English Classes is to leave the track on a diagonal in the current direction and then half circle to the track in the new direction. The standard Western ring reverse is to turn to the inside of the ring.
- b) Appropriate apparel and footwear must be worn in the competition ring and warm up areas.

11. **Equine Medication Control** - The NSEF endorses Clean Sport for all equine activities. Clean Sport (competing without performance enhancing medications) will ensure fair play in competition while maintaining the welfare of the horse. The Nova Scotia Equestrian Federation reserves the right to introduce drug testing at Scotia Series, with the proviso that due notice will be given. It is the NSEF's expectation that competitors will ensure their horse's performance is not enhanced by means of prohibited substances.

12. **Equine Welfare** -The NSEF is dedicated to the humane treatment and welfare of horses. Cruel, abusive or inhumane treatment of a horse at any NSEF Scotia Series event by any competitor, owner, coach, trainer or other person will not be tolerated anywhere on the competition grounds under any circumstances.

A horse may compete in Under Saddle or Driving competitions only after July 1st of its two year old year.

Horses entered in all events must be in good condition and must be serviceably sound. Final determination of horse's suitability to continue is ultimately the judge's decision. Unsoundness is defined as:

- a) Consistently observable at any gait under all circumstances.
- b) Marked nodding, hitching or shortened stride; or
- c) Minimal weight-bearing in motion and/or rest and inability to move.
- d) Any manifestation of pain, inability, disability, or deformity in the act of motion is considered unsoundness.

Any competitor that may in the opinion of officials and/or competition management be considered riding at risk of injury to themselves, or their horse will be asked to withdraw from further competition.

The welfare of the horse is paramount in our sport therefore the competition committee reserves the right to ask a horse to retire, either from a class or from the competition, in the event that it appears that it would not be productive for the horse to continue. This may be due to heat, unsoundness, or apparent over facing of the horse. In this event, entry fees for unused classes will be refunded by the office.

THIS SHOW IS A SPECTATOR ZONED SHOW. Following Phase 4 Covid Regulations, we recommend competitors are restricted to 1 rider per horse plus 2 support persons and coach.

Horses must work both ways of ring at all three gaits to demonstrate their ability with different leads. At the option of the judge, horses may be asked to extend the walk, jog or lope, one or both ways of the ring. Judge may ask all or just the top 12 horses to extend at the jog, however, never more than the top 12 horses may be asked to extend at the lope. Riders should sit at the extended jog. Horses are required to back easily and stand quietly.

Class # 5

Open Junior Western Horsemanship

Class # 6

Open Senior Western Horsemanship

Riders will be judged on seat, hands, ability to control and show horse. Only one hand is to be used for reining and hand not to change. (In the event a horse is five years of age or younger and is shown with a snaffle bit or hackamore, it is legal for a rider to show with two hands on the reins.) Clothing must be neat, clean and appropriate to the western style of riding. Chaps are optional. Western tack must be used. Horse may be asked to walk, jog and lope both ways

Open to both Western and English junior riders.

Open to both Western and English senior riders

Horses will follow a set pattern.

Class # 9
Maiden Pleasure Horse (English/Western)

Open to horses which have never won a 1st place ribbon in competitions up to the closing date of entries, judged on manners, performance and quality, class may be divided English and Western if enough entries permit.

Class # 10
Pleasure-Rider 35 & Over (English/Western)

Open to riders over 35 years. Open to horses and large ponies suitable for and used as pleasure mounts, judged on manners, quality and performance.

Class # 11
Open Junior English Equitation

Riders to be judged on seat, hands and ability to control horse/pony. Shown at a walk, trot and canter both ways of the ring

Class # 12
Open Senior English Equitation

Riders to be judged on seat, hands and ability to control horse/pony. Shown at walk, trot and canter both ways of the ring.

LEAD LINE / WALK TROT CLASSES

Class # 13
Lead Line (English/Western)

Ridden independently by a child 8 years & under and led by an adult. To walk and trot.

Class # 14
Walk Trot (English/Western)

Ridden by children 12 years & under. To walk and trot both ways of the ring. Judged on turnout of horse/pony and riders.

Shown at a flat footed walk, normal trot and easy canter, not to gallop, medium to light contact, working both ways of ring, demonstrating ability at different leads, to back easily and stand quiet.

Class #18 Senior Road Hack Horse

Horses to enter the ring at a walk, shown at a flat-footed walk with a reasonable loose rein, at a trot, strong trot and easy canter, may be asked to hand gallop (no more than 8 horses at time)

Class # 19

Open Ranch Trail

Western, entries must have legal equipment (ie bit). All obstacles will be as realistic as possible and designed to show a horse's ability and willingness to perform several tasks that might be asked of him during a normal day of ranch work. Horse will be shown in all three gaits, with credit for performing gaits on correct lead and alert attitude. There will be at least 6 and a max of 14 obstacles. Mandatory obstacles include: opening/closing gate; dismount; log drag. Other obstacles may include: ground tie; putting on/removing slicker; bridge; riding over loop; roping dummy; back; sidepass. An exhibitor who does not complete the course cannot place over one who does. Pattern posted at least 1 hour prior (warmup ring)

Class # 20

Open Versatility

Entries. One class in which one rider participates in Western Pleasure, English Pleasure & Barrels

Class # 21

Open Reining

To follow a pattern consisting of spins, flying lead changes, rollbacks and sliding stops. Pattern posted 1 hour prior to class. Horse should be willfully guided with little or no apparent resistance and dictated to completely. Any movement on its own is considered a lack of control, therefore a fault. Bit rules to follow general performance rules. Riders do not need to drop bridle for Judge. Please jog in (if walk-in pattern) and jog out to save ring time.

Open Western Pleasure

Open English Pleasure

GREEN HORSE CLASSES

\$10.00/Class

Green Horse/Pony is defined as a horse or pony as those in their first or second year of showing and who have not cantered or loped. All classes will be shown at the walk, trot/jog only.

Green horses/ponies can be shown in other classes where cantering/loping are not required. I.e. Showmanship classes.

In this division, any age horse or pony can be ridden with 2 hands in any legal bit or 1 handed in a curb bit.

Other than the defined horse or gait restrictions, all regular show rules apply.

Class # 24

Green Horse/Pony Equitation. To be judged based on the position and ability demonstrated by the rider.

Class # 25

Green Horse/Pony Horsemanship. To be judged on the position of the rider and the ability to control and show the horse/pony.

Class # 26a

Green Horse/Pony Western Pleasure. To show a free flowing stride at the walk trot/jog and exhibit the qualities of a pleasure to ride.

Class # 26b

Green Horse/Pony English Pleasure. To show a free flowing stride at the walk trot/jog and exhibit the qualities of a pleasure to ride.

OPEN MISCELLANEOUS CLASSES

Open Bareback Dollar

Walk, jog and lope with paper under the rider's leg. Rider not to wear shorts or chaps. Elimination class.

OPEN POLES AND BARRELS

Rider may start right or left of the first pole, then run the remainder of the pattern accordingly. Disqualification will result from going off course or crossing the finish line before the course is completed. There is no division of horse & pony. Ponies will race with horses.

5 second penalty will be added to each knockdown.

Class # 30 Junior Barrels

Class # 31 Senior Barrels

Rider may start right or left of the first barrel, then run the remainder of the pattern accordingly. Disqualification will result from going off course or crossing the finish line before the course is completed. Ponies will run with the horses.

5 second penalty will be added for each knockdown.

Run orders will be randomly drawn and posted at least 1 hour prior to class. Should a competitor have more than one horse, a spacing of five horses will be between the competitor's horses.

Horse/Rider CANNOT change combination (re Barrels & Poles). A competitor, horse/rider combination, qualifies only once per class.

SCOTIA SERIES HUNTER DIVISION

Hunter Over Fences - shown over suitable course of jumps: Judged on performance, manners, way of going and hunting soundness.

Hunter Under Saddle - shown at walk, trot and canter, both ways of the ring. Will be judged on performance, a flowing balanced performance, showing rhythm and willingness.

To be considered for year end rewards, in Under saddle classes, horses/ponies **MUST** compete and complete at least 1 over fences course.

Appropriate Hunt Attire must be worn unless at the Judge's discretion
