ANNAPOLIS VALLEY EXHIBITION - GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

Rule change only by Board approval

Board of Directors: Anne Callanan, Byron Lamb, Correna Keddy, John Bruce, Russell Ernst, Dave Leonard, Katrina Barrett, Kerwin Delong, Lori Height, Charlsea Fiske, Hilary Campbell

These General Rules apply to all competitions and exhibitors and have precedence over any other rules adopted by Sub-Committees in any case where there is a conflict between rules.

- 1. The Board of Directors has the final and absolute right to interpret all rules and regulations and determine all matters, questions or disputes. The Board has the right to amend or add to these rules and regulations as their judgment may determine, from time to time. Entries are accepted subject to this rule; by signing the entry form, participants agree to abide by the rules defined herein.
- 2. Management may remove exhibitors without refund for disorderly conduct.
- **3.** Management reserves the right to refuse any exhibitor for lack of space subject to the provision that space will be allocated on a first come first served basis.
- 4. All entries must be submitted online through the Annapolis Valley Exhibition website. Paper entry forms will not be accepted. Please refer to specific prize book for entry deadlines and rules. Late entries will only be accepted if space allows. A late fee will be charged. See entry form for amount.
- 5. Entries will not be accorded precedence as to order of receipt until they are complete in all respects. Entry fees are due upon submission of entry forms. No entry shall be considered complete until all applicable fees are paid in full.
- **6.** The Management shall have the sole right and discretion to allocate exhibits and exhibitors to whatever barn, building, stall, or space is considered appropriate, notwithstanding any apparent outward designation on the building, grounds or any plan.
- 7. Articles exhibited other than livestock must be produced, grown, created or manufactured in the current year.

GROUNDS AND BUILDINGS

- 1. The Exhibition building and grounds will be open on Sunday after 1pm prior to the Exhibition for the reception and arrangement of exhibits, unless specified under Class Rules. Exhibitors are reminded that they enter all exhibits at their own risk.
- 2. The Exhibition grounds will be open to the public during the Exhibition week at times determined by the Management and posted or advertised each year.
- **3.** No pets are allowed on the Exhibition property during Exhibition week, except pets of exhibitors which must be confined to the trailer park.
- 4. All officials will be designated by proper badges or other designation.
- 5. There is no exhibitor parking on the grounds. Supplies may be dropped off before 8:30 in the morning and vehicles are to be immediately moved to the designated exhibitor parking area in the main parking lot. ***First offense ticket on windshield; Second offense forfeit prize monies; Third offense vehicle(s) will be towed at the owner's expense.***
- **6.** The Annapolis Valley Exhibition restricts all smoking of tobacco, cannabis, and vapes within 15 metres of all structures on the Exhibition Grounds. No smoking or vaping of any substance is permitted in the bleachers.

JUDGING AND PRIZES

- 1. No person shall be permitted to enter the judge's ring while judging is in progress, except the judges, their attendants, show ring officials, and such exhibitors as have been called into the ring by the judge or judges.
- 2. No changes in classification can be made after judging commences.
- 3. Any person interfering with the judge(s) while in the discharge of their duties shall be removed from the grounds.
- 4. All judges shall give reasons for the placings when asked and may give reasons in any case.
- 5. No person shall be allowed to receive more than one prize in any one section of a non-livestock class. Accordingly, two entries may not be made in any one section or class. Special prizes may be awarded in addition.
- **6.** Any exhibitor found to have employed any dishonest measures shall not only forfeit the prize which might be awarded to him or her but shall, in future, be barred from competition in the Exhibition.

- 7. Due to the necessity of proceeding with judging as rapidly as possible, all animals must be ready to enter the ring when called and all other exhibits must be prepared and available when judging begins. Failure to comply with this regulation will result in forfeiting the right to show in the relevant class.
- 8. All protests of the judge's decisions must be submitted in writing to the Manager of the Exhibition and accompanied by a deposit of \$25.00. Protests or appeals must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal and must be delivered to the Manager within four (4) hours after the occasion for the protest. No protest will be accepted based on the contention that a judge has overlooked an exhibit. If the protest is not sustained, the deposit shall be forfeited.
- **9.** Prize money may be reduced up to 50% at the discretion of the Board in the event of reduced income due to bad weather, lack of entries, or other valid reasons.
- **10.** Committee discretion has the final word on whether livestock is fit to show.
- 11. All claims for prize money not received must be made to the Manager before September 30th of the current year.
- **12.** Special prizes require a special entry and special exhibit when the terms of the special class vary from the terms of the regular section.

LIVESTOCK ENTRIES

- 1. Stalls for all livestock entries shall be allotted in order of receipt of entries at the time of entry. Exhibitors may not trade stalls without obtaining the approval of Management and recording the approved trade at the Exhibition Office.
- 2. All registered animals are subject to being checked for registration. Registration papers and R.O.P. data must be available prior to and up to the time of judging. No animals will be accepted as purebred or registered until registration papers are available from the owner.
- 3. All animals must be owned by the exhibitor at least thirty (30) days prior to the date of the Exhibition.
- 4. Entries in classes comprised of more than one animal may be made up of animals shown individually.
- **5.** Any animal showing signs of infectious disease or parasite infection will be barred from the Exhibition and be removed immediately from the grounds.
- 6. All livestock competing for special prizes must also be entered in at least one (1) regular Exhibition class.
- 7. Feed and bedding for livestock is the responsibility of the exhibitor. All manure and bedding shall be cleaned up by 8:30 am each day. Stalls will be cleaned, and all manure and bedding must be removed from the stall when the animal leaves the grounds. A minimum charge of \$50.00 per stall will be assessed against exhibitors failing to abide by the rule. Should this charge not be paid promptly, the exhibitor will be prohibited from future participation until the fee is settled.
- 8. Grooming and care of animals will take place in the stalls or designated area. Cross-tying of livestock in the aisles is not permitted.
- 9. Due to concerns for the movement of traffic and safety of attendants and exhibitors at the Exhibition, the Board shall fix times for departure of livestock and other exhibits when classes have been completed each year. For the current year, livestock shall be moved to and from the grounds according to the following times:

Dairy – in and settled from 4pm Sunday to 10am Monday, out Wednesday by 10am. Beef – in and settled Wednesday between 1pm and 4pm, out after 9pm Saturday. Light Horse – as noted in prize book. Other Livestock – out 10pm Saturday.

- **10.** Livestock trailers are not permitted to be parked inside the grounds. Exhibitors in special Horse or Ox pulls will be permitted to work from their trailers, providing they ship in no more than 2 hours prior to the pull and leave the grounds within one hour of the completion of the pull in the area allocated. Animals must be supervised at all times and not left unattended. All others must be stabled.
- 11. The owner and handler of livestock will be responsible for the behaviour and control of his or her animal. Livestock must be wellbroke to halter. No dangerous, uncontrolled animals will be permitted. The Manager may order any such animal off the grounds without reimbursement for any entry fee or other fees paid.
- **12.** Trailer Park admission as Livestock Exhibitor requires participation in 3 classes or more. Trailer Park admission will be issued to non-exhibitors only if space permits, on a first come first served basis.
- 13. Campers/Trailers may arrive in the trailer court after 5pm Thursday before the Exhibition. Trailer court noise curfew is 11:00 pm.
- **14.** Any Trailer pumping Grey Water or Black Water onto the ground in the trailer park or Exhibition grounds will be removed immediately.

- **15.** After each Exhibition and all Weekend Events, trailers must be removed from the property within 24 hours or they will be removed at the owner's expense.
- 16. Returning exhibitors have first refusal of campground space. After the entry deadline, the office will allocate new exhibitor spots (or returning who missed a year) according to size of the trailer. Non-Exhibitors are allocated spots after all exhibitors are accommodated. Please note: if an exhibitor is not returning, that exhibitor cannot "give" a campground space to someone else; the office allocates campground spaces. The manager's decision is final.
- 17. Trailer Park: All 15 amps may be only 15 amps before the breaker trips. For example: the system will run a Fridge and Lights. A small Hot Water Heater will trip the breaker. Run Air Conditioners at your own risk. If there are any electrical problems in the Trailer Park, you will need a purchase order from the Office for Electrician to attend.

SAFETY OF EXHIBITS

- Employees will endeavour to protect exhibits and ensure good order, but owners themselves must assume all risk for exhibits.
 Should any exhibit be accidentally or willfully damaged, injured, lost or stolen, the Exhibition will provide whatever assistance it can towards the recovery of the same, but will not make any payment for the value thereof or reimbursement for the loss.
- 2. No Smoking within 15 metres (50 feet) of buildings, including barns and washrooms.

ANNAPOLIS VALLEY EXHIBITION LIQUOR AND SAFETY POLICY

The Board and Staff of the Annapolis Valley Exhibition Society wish our visitors to have a great time while at our Exhibition. Please note our policy on the supply of liquor during the Exhibition.

- No person under the age of 19 will be permitted to purchase/consume liquor on our site.
- Identification to be presented when requested.
- No liquor is to be consumed on the Exhibition grounds outside of our pub area.
- For residents and guests of the trailer park areas, liquor may only be consumed inside trailers. Failure to follow this directive may result in fines from the RCMP.
- Persons who appear impaired will be refused entry to the Exhibition grounds or pub and will be removed by security/RCMP.
- Persons who are violent or causing upset will be removed by security/RCMP and may be barred from the grounds for a period decided by the Board of Directors.
- Please be safe don't drink and drive. Impaired drivers will be reported to the RCMP.
- T-shirts or shirts must be worn at all times during your visit.
- Please enjoy yourself and act responsibly.

ANNAPOLIS VALLEY EXHIBITION OPEN LIGHT HORSE SHOW RULES

- 1. All Junior/Youth mounted riders, 18 years & under as of January 1st of current year, MUST wear protective headgear.
- 2. Proof of \$1,000,000.00 insurance to be attached to entry form.
- 3. The Committee reserves the right to limit the number of entries.
- 4. Please report to the Exhibition Office before stabling. <u>No re-arranging stalls or stabling without consent.</u>
- 5. Stalls must be stripped of bedding and manure before leaving the grounds so they are ready for the next exhibitor. Failure to clean stall will result in a \$50 stall cleaning fee. If the fee remains unpaid, the competitor will be ineligible to register for subsequent events hosted by the Annapolis Valley Exhibition.
- 6. **Health of Animals** It is advised that all entries should be immunized against equine influenza and rhino within one year. It is suggested that this should have been done at least one month before the show in case of any reaction. Any animal which appears, in the opinion of the Exhibition Veterinarian, to be ill will be asked to leave the grounds. It is also advised that all entries be Coggins tested within the previous six months.
- 7. **Refunds** Veterinarian certificate for horse, Doctor certificate for rider, for refund of entry fee within 2 weeks of show.
- 8. **Class Times** Owing to the length of the Horse Show Program no delays will be tolerated. All entries must enter the ring immediately when a class is called. When the gate is closed, no further entries will be admitted.
- 9. Classes with less than 3 entries may be cancelled or combined with other classes at the discretion of the light horse committee.
- 10. Vehicle Entry All vehicles and trailers must enter through the West Gate unless other arrangements have been made with the manager.
- 11. Horse Trailers There will be no parking of livestock trailers on the Exhibition Grounds. Reserved parking for livestock trailers in parking lot.
- 12. Bedding Exhibitors must bring their own.
- 13. Cross-tying No cross-tying of any animal in the barns.
- 14. Show ring attire required for all classes (except costume class).

- 15. Point Systems For classes where points will accumulate for a division Champion, points will be awarded in the following manner: 1st 7; 2nd 5; 3rd 4; 4th 3; 5th 2; 6th 1. A competitor, horse/rider combination, will qualify only once per class. In the event of a tie for Champion, the exhibitor with the most 1st place ribbons will win. If there is still a tie, 2nd place ribbons will determine the champion.
- 16. Please note on your entry form that we now request the name of your Coach if you are using their services at the competition. We also ask that you confirm your horse is up to date on vaccines for Equine Influenza and EHV 1-4. Please consult your veterinarian if you are not sure. THIS IS NOT REQUIRED BUT HIGHLY RECOMMENDED. Thank you!
- 17. Annapolis Valley Exhibition Light Horse will have designated Scotia Series classes. Classes eligible for Scotia Series points will be identified as Scotia Series.

SCOTIA SERIES OVERVIEW

- The NSEF Scotia Series is a provincial circuit.
- Athletes must be NSEF Members to be eligible for Scotia Series Annual Awards.
- Athletes from Nova Scotia competing in the Scotia Series live in one of the six Nova Scotia Districts.
- Annual awards are presented at the NSEF Awards Reception. The Sportsmanship Award for the junior athlete is awarded by nomination.
- References to Athlete(s) throughout this handbook refer to the human athlete (competitor, driver, or handler).

SCOTIA SERIES COMPETITION RULES AND REGULATIONS

In addition to the competition organizing committee's requirements, there are also NSEF requirements specific to Scotia Series.

Competitors are responsible for knowing the Rules of the Scotia Series Competitions (https://horsenovascotia.ca/Scotia-Series) and for identifying which classes meet the criteria for Scotia Series Awards.

1. Membership

- a) Current NSEF membership is required to compete and qualify for Annual awards.
- b) Non-NS residents require an out of province P/TSO membership to be eligible to compete.
- c) NSEF memberships can be verified online, or members must provide proof of membership. Out of Province members must provide proof of membership.g
- 2. Age Categories: where age is indicated the age is defined as of January 1^s of the current year.
- **3. Person Responsible:** The person who signs the entry form is the person responsible for the welfare of the horse and for the actions of the support team of that entry. Junior competitors must have their entry form signed by the parent or legal guardian deemed responsible for said junior.
- 4. Competitor Conduct: any act of discourtesy or disobedience by an owner, groom, athlete, coach, or family member to an official, COC member, other spectators, or competitors while at the competition, will disqualify the associated horse and competitor from competition. The COC has the right to remove anyone from the competition without being liable for compensation or damages.
- 5. Protective Headgear: Although competition management may enforce a stricter helmet policy, all competitions must adhere to the following NSEF Policy on Protective Headwear: NSEF Helmet Policy: <u>All</u> Competitors must wear ASTM/SEI, or BSI/BS EN, approved protective headgear, with the safety harness correctly secured at all times while mounted or driving at the competition or anywhere on the competition grounds.

Exception - Competitors 19 years old as of January 1st, competing in the *Western Performance Division* without an approved safety helmet must submit a signed Scotia Series Helmet Waiver to the competition organizer.

- 6. **Ring Numbers**: issued by the competition office and must be worn at all times. This includes the competition arena and the schooling/warm up area. If at any time a horse is being handled by an individual, other than the competitor, the handler must be in possession of the ring number.
- 7. Lunging of horses is permitted in a specified designated area only. Lunging is not permitted in any areas where horses are being ridden or driven. In any class or event requiring equipment, athletes MUST NOT use the competition's equipment for practicing before the class or event begins, on penalty of disqualification. Participants may only use obstacles provided by the competition committee in the warmup ring.
- 8. Mannerly stallions may be shown by SENIOR COMPETITORS ONLY.
- 9. Falls:
 - a) An athlete is considered to have fallen when, either voluntarily or involuntarily, separation from the unfallen horse occurs in such a way that said athlete touches the ground or finds it necessary to seek support or assistance to regain a seated position.
 - b) An athlete has fallen when vaulting or remounting to regain sitting astride the horse is required.
 - c) A horse is considered to have fallen when at the same time both its shoulder and quarters have touched either the ground or the obstacle and the ground.

10. Safety (in addition to discipline specific rules stated throughout this document):

- a) Competitors are responsible to know the method of reversing used during group classes. The competition committee shall indicate the method of reversing during group classes, whether it is to the inside or toward the wall. i.e. A proper competition ring reverse for most English Classes is to leave the track on a diagonal in the current direction and then half circle to the track in the new direction. The standard Western ring reverse is to turn to the inside of the ring.
- b) Appropriate apparel and footwear must be worn in the competition ring and warm up areas.
- **11. Equine Medication Control:** The NSEF endorses Clean Sport for all equine activities. Clean Sport (competing without performance enhancing medications) will ensure fair play in competition while maintaining the welfare of the horse. The Nova Scotia Equestrian Federation reserves the right to introduce drug testing at Scotia Series, with the proviso that due notice will be given. It is the NSEF's expectation that competitors will ensure their horse's performance is not enhanced by means of prohibited substances.
- **12. Equine Welfare:** The NSEF is dedicated to the humane treatment and welfare of horses. Cruel, abusive or inhumane treatment of a horse at any NSEF Scotia Series event by any competitor, owner, coach, trainer or other person will not be tolerated anywhere on the competition grounds under any circumstances.

A horse may compete in Under Saddle or Driving competitions only after July 1st if it's a two year old year.


Horses entered in all events must be in good condition and must be serviceably sound. Final determination of a horse's suitability to continue is ultimately the judge's decision. Unsoundness is defined as:

- a) Consistently observable at any gait under all circumstances.
- b) Marked nodding, hitching or shortened stride; or
- c) Minimal weight-bearing in motion and/or rest and inability to move.
- d) Any manifestation of pain, inability, disability, or deformity in the act of motion is considered unsoundness.

Any competitor that may in the opinion of officials and/or competition management be considered riding at risk of injury to themselves, or their horse, will be asked to withdraw from further competition.

The welfare of the horse is paramount in our sport; therefore, the competition committee reserves the right to ask a horse to retire, either from a class or from the competition, in the event that it appears that it would not be productive for the horse to continue. This may be due to heat, unsoundness, or apparent over facing of the horse. In this event, entry fees for unused classes will be refunded by the office.

13. \$3 Scotia Series Fee: this fee is charged per horse/rider combo when they enter at least 1 Scotia Series class (onetime \$3 fee per horse/rider combo regardless of the number of classes entered).



ANNAPOLIS VALLEY EXHIBITION LIGHT HORSE CLASSES

SCOTIA SERIES WESTERN DIVISION \$5.00/Class

Competitors must wear appropriate Western Attire

$Trail - 1^{st}$ \$25 2^{nd} \$20 3^{rd} \$15 4^{th} \$12

To be shown over a course of obstacles. Judged on the performance of a safe, sensible, well-mannered horse. **Note:** Junior and Senior Trail will run as a combined class but will be pinned separately.

Class #1 Junior Trail Class #2 Senior Trail

Western Pleasure – 1st \$25 2nd \$20 3rd \$15 4th \$12

Horses must work both ways of ring at all three gaits to demonstrate their ability with different leads. At the option of the judge, horses may be asked to extend the walk, jog or lope, one or both ways of the ring. Judge may ask all or just the top 12 horses to extend at the jog, however, never more than the top 12 horses may be asked to extend at the lope. Riders should sit at the extended jog. Horses are required to back easily and stand quietly.

Class # 3 Junior Western Pleasure #1 Class # 4 Junior Western Pleasure #2 Class # 5 Senior Western Pleasure #1 Class # 6 Senior Western Pleasure #2

Western Horsemanship -1st \$25 2nd \$20 3rd \$15 4th \$12

Riders will be judged on seat, hands, ability to control and show horse. Only one hand is to be used for reining and hand not to change. (In the event a horse is five years of age or younger and is shown with a snaffle bit or hackamore, it is legal for a rider to show with two hands on the reins.) Clothing must be neat, clean and appropriate to the western style of riding. Chaps are optional. Western tack must be used. Horse may be asked to walk, jog and lope both ways. Pattern at judge's discretion.

Class # 7 Junior Western Horsemanship Class # 8 Senior Western Horsemanship

Reining - 1st \$25 2nd \$20 3rd \$15 4th \$12

To follow a pattern consisting of spins, flying lead changes, rollbacks and sliding stops. Pattern posted 1 hour prior to class. Horse should be willfully guided with little or no apparent resistance and dictated to completely. Any movement on its own is considered a lack of control, therefore a fault. Bit rules to follow general performance rules. Riders do not need to drop bridle for Judge. Please jog in (if walk-in pattern) and jog out to save ring time.

Class # 9 Junior Reining Class #10 Senior Reining

SCOTIA SERIES POLES AND BARRELS \$15/class

Poles - 1st \$50 2nd \$40 3rd \$30 4th \$20 5th \$15 6th \$10

Rider may start right or left of the first pole, then run the remainder of the pattern accordingly. Disqualification will result from going off course or crossing the finish line before the course is completed. There is no division of horse & pony. Ponies will race with horses.

5 second penalty will be added to each knockdown.

Class # 11 Junior Poles Class # 12 Senior Poles

Barrels - 1st \$50 2nd \$40 3rd \$30 4th \$20 5th \$15 6th \$10

Rider may start right or left of the first barrel, then run the remainder of the pattern accordingly. Disqualification will result from going off course or crossing the finish line before the course is completed. Ponies will run with the horses. 5 second penalty will be added for each knockdown.

Class # 13 Junior Barrels Class # 14 Senior Barrels

RANCH RIDING DIVISION \$5/class

Ranch Riding (Scotia Series) – 1st \$25 2nd \$20 3rd \$15 4th \$12

Primary considerations are the horse's quality of movement and overall manners and responsiveness while performing the required maneuvers. The class should allow the horse to show its ability to work at a forward working speed while under the control of the rider. A horse being shown with light contact should be rewarded. Each horse will work individually, performing both required and optional maneuvers. Horses will follow a set pattern.

Class # 15 Junior Ranch Riding Class # 16 Senior Ranch Riding

Ranch Pleasure (Scotia Series) – 1st \$25 2nd \$20 3rd \$15 4th \$12

Judged on versatility, attitude and movement of a working horse. The class shows the animal's ability to work at a forward, working speed while under control. Horses are required to perform the required movements which include the walk, trot, extended trot, lope, stop, and back. The horse's performance should simulate a horse riding outside the confines of an arena and that of a working ranch horse. Light contact should be rewarded and horse does not have to be shown on a full drape of reins.

Class # 17 Junior Ranch Pleasure Class # 18 Senior Ranch Pleasure

Ranch Trail (Non Scotia Series) – 1st \$25 2nd \$20 3rd \$15 4th \$12

Western, entries must have legal equipment (ie bit). All obstacles will be as realistic as possible and designed to show a horse's ability and willingness to perform several tasks that might be asked of him during a normal day of ranch work. Horse will be shown in all three gaits, with credit for performing gaits on correct lead and alert attitude. There will be at

least 6 and a max of 14 obstacles. Mandatory obstacles include: opening/closing gate; dismount; log drag. Other obstacles may include: ground tie; putting on/removing slicker; bridge; riding over loop; roping dummy; back; sidepass. An exhibitor who does not complete the course cannot place over one who does. Pattern posted at least 1 hour prior (warmup ring). The ring will be open prior to start of class for competitors to work around, but not over, obstacles. **Note:** Junior and Senior Ranch Trail will run as a combined class but will be pinned separately.

SCOTIA SERIES ENGLISH CLASSES \$5.00/Class

Correspondingly, 50% of points awarded will be based on The Judge's subjective interpretation of Values Based Horsemanship and 50% of points awarded will be based on objectively observable and measurable/timed maneuvers and obstacles.

- Values Based Horsemanship points can include but are not limited to: expression (horse and handler), appropriate use of equipment/tools (or absence of equipment/tools), attentiveness to and acknowledgement of horse's 'try,' appropriate application of pressure, appropriately timed release, 'feel and timing.'
- Goal Based Horsemanship points can include but are not limited to: speed (speed of movement/speed of transition/speed of execution), precision, appropriate turnout/appointments, proper execution of obstacle/maneuver (loosely based on AQHA and ILHA rules?)
